The Connection from Hospital to Hospitality

This edition of the Alumnae Spotlight takes us to a farm in Irving, New York, at the home of Harriet (Brauer) Rupp. Harriet, a 1951 graduate of Swedish Covenant Hospital's School of Nursing, looks back at her nursing school experience with gratitude for its role in "turning a shy girl like me into a confident and compassionate Christian woman with the skills to care for others." Perhaps most notable for Harriet is how the hospital taught her hospitality, which she has practiced extensively for many years.

Harriet was born and raised in Rockford, IL. At a young age, she desired to help others and felt that she would likely accomplish this through missionary work. She later developed an interest in nursing, knowing that it would be a useful skill to have on the mission field. Following a relative's recommendation to apply to Swedish Covenant's School of Nursing for the best education and training, she was accepted and started in 1948.

Harriet looks back on her training at SCH with the fondest of memories. The quality of education was excellent and nursing students were given every opportunity to work the floors and be at the bedside providing meaningful care with genuine compassion. According to Harriet, what separates the Swedish Covenant experience from that of other nursing schools was the emphasis on faith and Christian values. "The best part of each day was in the way it began, at Chapel." This time of singing and praying prepared her for anything she would face in the day ahead. Harriet specifically recalls being "scared to death" on her first day in the operating room, but what gave her peace and the ability to succeed was the hymn sung earlier that day at Chapel, *Day by Day*, which played continuously in her head.

Following SCH, Harriet found a nursing position at a VA hospital in Madison, WI. Sadly, one year into this job, Harriet's mother passed away causing her decision to leave this work behind to move home and take on a different type of work; helping her father raise her young brothers. During this time, she also took on some private duty nursing jobs in the evening, one of which was providing care for an uncle who had recently become a paraplegic.

Throughout these experiences, Harriet remained interested in becoming a missionary. She moved to Buffalo, NY, in the late 1950s to study Theology at Buffalo Bible Institute. It was here where she met a man named Ellsworth Rupp and the two were soon married. Harriet jokes, "I left school with a Mrs. Degree." In 1962, they bought a home on 60 acres of Concord grape farmland. If you have tasted Welch's grape juice or jelly, there is a chance the grapes came from Harriet's farm, as she has long held a contract as a member of

Welch's family of growers.

Harriet points out that she never left for missionary work in the traditional sense, but instead fulfilled her missionary work at home; caring for and modeling her faith not only to her five children and ten grandchildren, but also countless strangers. For years, she has opened her home to an organization made up of Christian seniors who travel, as well as International Students Inc., which has placed many college age students from around the world at her house for a few days at time. Living in proximity to numerous colleges makes her home an ideal location for students. To this day, Harriet still cherishes every opportunity to get to know her young guests, learn about their countries and culture, and share with them her words of witness.

Harriet supports Swedish Covenant Hospital, most notably with a charitable gift annuity that allows a donor to make a future gift to the hospital, receive a lifetime stream of income along with a tax deduction. She feels privileged to be a member of the Nurse Alumnae Association and praises the group's continued dedication to Swedish Covenant. She believes all SCH grads would agree, "If I were ill, there's nowhere else I would want to go."

Nurses Help Local School

Swedish Covenant nurses' service to the community extends beyond the walls of the hospital. Last winter, a number of nurses volunteered their time helping judge science fair projects at neighboring Budlong Elementary School. We are proud of their dedication to community service, health and education.





Chronic Disease Program

For the second straight year, Swedish Covenant Hospital has received a \$100,000 grant from the George A. Ackermann Memorial Fund to support the hospital's Chronic Disease Care Transitions program. The goal of this program is to help patients understand and manage diseases such as congestive heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and renal failure in order to reduce the risk of hospital readmission.

The program utilizes SCH physicians, nurses and wellness coaches in follow-up appointments soon after hospital discharge, remote telehealth monitoring, home visits and follow-up telephone calls with patients. In the program's first year, the generous support of the George A. Ackermann Memorial Fund directly impacted the care of over 300 patients, primarily those of an underserved population. Now, in its second year, the program is continuing to prove highly effective at improving the health of patients and reducing the hospital's 30-day readmission rate.

Oncology Affiliation with Rush University Medical Center

Swedish Covenant Hospital has established an affiliation with Rush University Medical Center (RUMC) for improving the quality and accessibility of cancer services in Chicago's northside communities. Collaborating with RUMC in this way helps bring the most up-to-date research and treatment opportunities to the SCH community.

This affiliation will merge clinical, research and academic programs at SCH with those at RUMC. It will strengthen the hospital's ability to help patients who have been diagnosed with an array of cancer types, including breast, colon, lung, liver and prostate cancer. For example, if a patient presents at SCH with an unusual tumor, the new affiliation will speed SCH's ability to get in touch with RUMC experts and combine knowledge and resources.

New Outpatient Surgery Center

Last summer the Foster Medical Pavilion opened its doors on the Swedish Covenant campus, beginning a new chapter in the hospital's history. The building offers many physician specialty offices and, most notably, an exceptional outpatient surgery center. Complete with the appropriate space, technology and expertise, the Center for Ambulatory Surgery has quickly become a valuable asset in enabling the hospital to meet the needs of the community today and well into the future.

The center provides patients care in specialties including orthopedics, ENT, pain management, podiatry, general surgery, urology, and ophthalmology. Nearly 550 surgical procedures have been performed since the opening of the Center with a significant increase expected as more residents of Chicago and surrounding suburbs learn about its world-class outpatient surgery experience.

With this new model in mind, Mary Koleff-May (Magnet Program Director) and I had the opportunity to attend the 2012 ANCC National Magnet Conference® held in Los Angeles, California. As one of the Nurse Alumnae Association's most distinguished members, Virginia Ohlson held a prominent nursing career centered on compassionate care and higher learning. The fund honors the memory of Virginia and addresses a genuine need of Swedish Covenant's Nursing Department to provide educational support to our compassionate nurses pursuing advanced degrees.

In addition to the Virginia Ohlson scholarship, the Alumnae Association will be awarding its traditional scholarships to North Park University undergraduate nursing students at the Nurse's Week ceremony.

Women's Health Initiative

When I think about women's health, certainly my mother, wife and daughters come to mind, and so do the 45,000 women annually served by Swedish Covenant Hospital and the many others in the community who are challenged to receive healthcare due to financial/cultural/logistical barriers. Many of these women represent a highly ethnically, culturally and socio-economically diverse population.

Within this initiative we are building the Women's Health Center, combining a full line of women's health services, state of the art equipment, female clinicians and private exam/consultation rooms. This new area is anticipated to open in the spring of 2014. In addition, a resource center and community outreach program will improve patient knowledge of health options.
